



SLYC Kicks Off Racing Season

The first race of the sailing season got underway on May 4 (see photos on page 4 and photo above) with six boats registered to compete in what turned out to be more challenging conditions than anticipated. The fleet of this first race featured a diverse mix of vessels, including Catalina 38, Westsail 32, Catalina 30, and the nimble Holder 20. Every season, SLYC welcomes all boats in an effort to increase the size of its sailing fleet. Before the competitors could even cross the starting line, "Renaissance," the Westsail 32 skippered by Phil Bogaert, experienced transmission failure while making her way to the starting area. She and her crew were provided assistance and safely returned to her mooring.

At the 9:30 skippers' meeting, the Harbor District's mast presented a rare sight that morning: two red triangles flapping

in the strengthening wind—the universal signal for a gale advisory (see picture on right). Despite the warning, crews gathered for what may become something of a tradition, posing for a group photo in front of the signal flags. These moments of sailing fellowship, especially in the face of challenging conditions, remind us why we're part of this community of sailors.

With safety in mind, the race committee made the decision to restrict the course to the inner waters of San Luis Bay. By midday, their caution was validated as

whitecaps began forming even within the relative protection of the breakwater. Sails reefed, crews tethered, the competition remained fierce even on the shortened course, with boats and sailors tested not just against each other but against the elements as well.

The racing featured two distinct courses. Race 1 covered a distance of 3.18 nautical miles on Course 15, while Race 2 ran a shorter 1.78 nautical mile course with two laps. In Race 1, **Kevin Williams** on "Fear Knot" showcased superior boat handling in

the challenging conditions, finishing first with a corrected time of 0:26:26. **Pat Mullen** followed in second place, while **Randall Rundstrom's** "Fat Cat" rounded out the top three. **Pat Mullen** came back strong in Race 2, claiming victory with an impressive corrected time of 0:17:25. Rundstrom moved up to second place, pushing **Kevin Williams** to third.

The final standings in the Monohull Division were dominated by consistent performances across both races: 1. **Roger Briggs** aboard "Second Wind" (Catalina 30), 2. **Kevin Williams** aboard "Fear Knot" (Holder 20), 3. **Randall Rundstrom** aboard "Fat Cat" (Catalina 38), 4. **Maxime Jeanneau** aboard "bw3" (Holder 20), 5. **Kate McInerney** aboard "Blondie" (Catalina 30). Notably absent from the race was "Renaissance" skippered by **Phil Bogaert**, who experienced technical difficulties.

This event, as all other races, would not be possible without dedicated volunteers. Mark Plassard, Dave Ouellet, and



Bruno Giuffrida formed the core Race Committee team for Ocean Race 1, setting up operations at the Cal Poly Pier where they managed the 11:00 AM race start following the 9:30 AM skippers' meeting by Hartford Pier. **Michael Ginn** and **Randy Kingsbury** crewing the chase boat were standing ready to place the race markers and assist if needed. Meanwhile, **Corissa Burnett** ensured everyone stayed energized by coordinating lunch support for the volunteers. **Mike D.** snapped great shots of the action as the races unfolded


